WELCOME VISITOR!

Welcome to St. David's! We are so glad that you have joined us today.

Is this your first time at St. David's or any Episcopal church? Our services change somewhat from week to week and from season to season, but in general this is what you can expect on a typical Sunday.

- We acknowledge our sins and ask for forgiveness, out loud and together. This is followed by an assurance that all our sins are indeed forgiven through the mercy of our Lord Jesus Christ.
- We look to Holy Scripture for guidance and usually hear four Bible passages; one from the Old Testament, one from the Book of Psalms, one from the New Testament, and one from the Gospels. Members of the congregation generally read all except the Gospel, which is read by the Priest, and the sermon is normally based on one of the Scripture passages.
- We declare our faith, publicly, speaking the words of either the Nicene Creed or the Apostles' Creed.
- We do a lot of praying, out loud and together. Many of the prayers, drawn from the Book of Common Prayer, are led by members of the congregation rather than clergy.
- Most Sundays we receive Holy Communion as a tangible reminder that Christ died for all and all are welcome to receive communion at St. David's.

Episcopalians are comfortable with a wide variety of physical expressions of devotion during worship. You may see people bowing, making the sign of the cross, kneeling or standing; none of these gestures are expected of visitors. It's a personal choice.

In general, we sit to listen and learn, we stand to praise God in song and to affirm our faith, and we kneel or sit (or stand!) to pray. Again, it's a personal choice. You should feel free to participate in whatever way is comfortable for you.

You will find three important books at each pew: a black Holy Bible, a blue hymnal, and a red Episcopal Book of Common Prayer. You are invited to spend a little time in reading or reflection. Aside from the Sermon, all of the service, compiled from these three sources, is contained in this leaflet. All you need to do is follow along and join in.

Confused and need a buddy? Any of us will be happy to help you find your way.

There are Connect Cards in front of you; please feel free to use them to communicate if you like, or linger after service so we can greet you personally.

Again, we are glad to have you with us today and hope to see you back at St. David's soon.

A Reading for African American History Month

An excerpt from a speech by Martin Luther King, Jr., November 17, 1957, in Montgomery, Ala.

"Another way that you love your enemy is this:

When the opportunity presents itself for you to defeat your enemy, that is the time which you must not do it.

There will come a time, in many instances, when the person who hates you most, the person who has misused you most, the person who has gossiped about you most, the person who has spread false rumors about you most, there will come a time when you will have an opportunity to defeat that person.

It might be in terms of a recommendation for a job; it might be in terms of helping that person to make some move in life. That's the time you must do it [LOVE]. That is the meaning of love.

In the final analysis, love is not this sentimental something that we talk about. It's not merely an emotional something. Love is creative, understanding goodwill for all men. It is the refusal to defeat any individual.

When you rise to the level of love, of its great beauty and power, you seek only to defeat evil systems. Individuals who happen to be caught up in that system, you love, but you seek to defeat the system."

A participatory sermon for St. David's Episcopal Church, based on the Beatitudes in Matthew 5: 1-12 and Luke 6:17-20.

Officiant:

In speaking the Beatitudes, Jesus reveals His mind, His values, His passion, and His Love. Help us to hear and understand what you are saying, Lord Jesus.

Silence

Officiant:

Blessed are those who are convinced of their basic dependency on God and who put all their trust in God... whose lives are uncluttered... emptied of those things that matter less... and those for whom the riches of this world are less important.

All:

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Lector:

Blessed are those who wear compassion like a garment, those who can walk in another's shoes, and those who have learned how to find themselves by losing themselves in another's sorrows.

All:

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

Officiant:

Blessed are those who know that all things come from God, self, soul, and body, and all return to God, so that they can be content with their greatness and their smallness, knowing themselves and being true to themselves.

All:

"Blessed are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth."

Lector:

Blessed are those who are hungry for justice, truth, and righteousness... who live into their Baptismal covenant of "seeking and serving Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself." and "striving for justice and peace among all people and respecting the dignity of every human being."

All:

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be satisfied."

Officiant:

Blessed are the merciful... those who remember how often they have been forgiven, and are able to extend forgiveness to others in their lives.

All:

"Blessed are the merciful, for they shall obtain mercy."

Lector:

Blessed are the simple and the intelligent among us whose hearts are free to love and to keep on loving... whose lives are not a pretense... who love You and who love their neighbors... those who avoid chasing after false gods, idols, and images and are seeking honestly for the truth in You.

All:

"Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

Officiant:

Blessed are those who seek to create peace... who hope to build paths that unite instead of walls that might divide... those who seek the healing powers of Your Holy Spirit in themselves, their families, their communities, and the world.

All:

"Blessed are the peacemakers, for they shall be called sons and daughters of God"

Lector:

Blessed are those who dare stand up in the face of oppression from any source and speak Your Name and utter Your words... whose love for You and their families, friends, and neighbors has been tried in the furnace and found to be precious, like gold... who have lived out their belief, not only with their lips, but with their lives.

All:

"Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. Blessed are you when men revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely on my account."

Lector:

We are thankful, dear God, for those among us with good attitudes, believing in forgiveness, redemption, reconciliation, and resurrection... who know the costs of discipleship,

speaking a prophetic word, and living a Christian life... who believe that the Gospel is Good news... and whose ultimate trust is in your promise of salvation and eternal life.

All:

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven, for so men prosecuted the prophets who were before you."

Officiant:

Let us pray.

O God, our creator and sustainer, you loved us long before we knew ourselves to be loveable and you love us still.

Give us, we pray, a greater awareness of your love for all people, and a renewed confidence in the action of your Grace in us and in our church.

Fill us with more love, and inspire us with a greater compassion, born out of the example of the humility of your Son, Jesus Christ.

We praise you for your mysterious ways and for your visible presence among us.

Through the power and presence of the Holy Spirit, help us to live into the compassion of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to come ever closer to His words and examples of Beatitude-living.

All:


